Today we begin the consecutive reading of Luke's Gospel, which was originally joined to Luke's other work, the Acts of the Apostles. The way the story is told prepares us for what happens in Acts.

When the Jews returned home after the exile in Babylon, the nation had to be rebuilt. The Persians entrusted this task to Ezra. Ezra brought back with him from Babylon the book of the law of Moses which he solemnly read to the people (First Reading). Thus he called upon them to rededicate themselves to God.

The Gospel shows Jesus too proclaiming the word of God. In the synagogue at Nazareth, he makes his own a passage from Isaiah, and uses it to announce a program for his ministry. He is sent, not to the wealthy or the powerful, but to the poor and the lowly, the oppressed and the suffering. Here we see Luke's concern for the poor and the afflicted.

Who are the poor? The poor are all the dispossessed of this world, all those who are waiting for liberation. The good news must not be limited to spiritual blessings only. But the poor are also those who live on bread alone and who never hear the Word of God.

### Commentary on the Doctrine Of the Most Holy Eucharist

(Articles taken from the Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church)

#### 1. The Sacrificial Meaning of Christ's Words

The sacrifice of expiation – The pages of the Old Testament in which the Servant of the Lord would be described in particularly moving terms are those of Isaiah 53, wherein a mysterious and innocent person was being described, a man of sorrows and one knowing infirmity, wounded on account of the sins of his people, silent and carrying the sins of "the many." Jesus Christ also used the expression "of the many" in the institution of the Eucharist (Mk 14:22-25; Mt 26:26-29); it is found also in the verse of the Gospels about the office of the Son of Man: "The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mt 20:28).

Thus do we know Christ as the person to bear and to carry out the office of the Servant of the Lord, who handed Himself over for the expiation of the sins of the human race (Is 53:10). In the Texts of the institution of the Eucharist, the Greek prepositions "hyper" and "peri" are used which customarily are employed when speaking of the sacrifice of expiation, indicating at the same time the one who receives the benefit of the expiation. Likewise, concerning the blood that has been poured forth, we have the Greek word "ekchinomenon."

### REFLECTION

#### **Grace is unlimited**

Human beings are frail and foolish. We have been told that grace is to be found in the universe. But in our human foolishness and short-sightedness we imagine divine grace to be finite, and for this reason we tremble. But the moment comes when our eyes are opened, and we see that grace is infinite. Grace demands nothing from us but that we await it with confidence and acknowledge it with gratitude. Grace makes no conditions and singles out none of us in particular. Grace takes us all to its bosom and proclaims a general amnesty. (*Isak Dinesen*).
