Amos is sent to prophesy to the people of Israel (First Reading). In the Gospel we have the sending out of the Twelve.

Amos was a prophet by divine call. In his case the call had come to a poor, unsophisticated shepherd and 'dresser of sycamore trees', a total outsider to the ranks of professional prophets. Much the same could be said about the men Jesus chose 'to be with him'. Jesus having instructed them, the time had come for them to take an active part in his ministry. Their mission was an extension of his own mission, and he gave them the power to accomplish this.

In understanding his instructions as to what they were to take with them, we must remember that this was only a temporary mission, of short duration and limited to the surrounding Jewish towns and villages. The final commissioning, in which they were sent to the whole world, was still in the future.

We who wish to live with the Eucharist must, more than anyone else, live an interior life. In the Eucharist the life of Jesus Christ is all interior. Be recollected at his feet rather than perform acts of generosity where the soul ordinarily puts aside its recollection to become scattered. Many

Recollection

Catholics are too busy. Doing this, doing that. Going here, going there. It's not that their intentions are bad, but often times the result of constant activity is that people are not recollected. People can mistakenly think that activity means spiritual depth. This is not necessarily the case. Remember what Jesus told Martha: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things; only one thing is necessary". That one necessary thing is spending time at the feet of Jesus in prayer and recollection. To be recollected means to live an interior life, always aware that you are in the presence of God. The person who is recollected is interiorly still, tranquil, and attentive to God speaking in the depths of their heart, mind, and soul. Today, close your eyes and think about our Eucharistic Lord in the tabernacle. Offer him your love, devotion, and adoration. Know that his Eucharistic heart beats for you. Ask for the grace to be more recollected and willing to separate yourself from anything in your life that takes away your Eucharistic recollection.

angels. In these modern times, many do not really believe in angels and their eagerness to help us in all sorts of situations, if we call upon them through our prayers. Fr. Sietz will bring enlightenment to us, in their regard. So, do mark the above dates on your calendars and plan on coming. Allow your guardian angels to inspire you to attend. St. Mark mentions by name a number of brothers of Jesus, and refers in general to his sisters. But the word "brother" does not necessarily mean son of the same parents. It can also indicate other degrees of relationship - cousins, nephews etc. Thus in Genesis

13:8 and 14:14 and 16 Lot is called the brother of Abraham (translated as "kinsman" in RSV), whereas we know that he was Abraham's nephew, the son of Abraham's brother Haran. The same is true of Laban, who is called the brother of Jacob (Genesis 29:15) although he was his mother's brother (Gen 29:15); there are other instances: cf. 1 Chronicles 23:21-22, etc. This confusion is due to the poverty of Hebrew and Aramaic language: in the absence of distinct terms, the same word, brother, is used to designate different degrees of relationship.

From other Gospel passages we know that James and Joses (Mk 15:40), who are mentioned here, were sons of Mary of Clophas (Jn 19:25). We know less about Judas and Simon: it seems that they are the apostles Simon the Cananaean (Mt 10:4) and Judas the son of James (Lk 6:16), the author of the Catholic Epistle, in which he describes himself as "brother" of James. In any event, although James, Simon and Judas are referred to as brothers of Jesus, it is nowhere said they were "sons of Mary' - which would have been the natural thing if they had been our Lord's brothers in the strict sense. Jesus always appears as an only son: "to the people of Nazareth, he is "the son of Mary" (Mt 13:55). When he was dying Jesus entrusted his mother to St. John (cf. Jn 19:26-27), which shows that Mary had no other children. To this is added the constant belief of the Church, which regards Mary as the ever-virgin: "a perfect virgin before, while, and forever after she gave birth" (Paul IV, Cum quorumdam).
